Reports indicate food supplies and the economy of Zaire are getting very bad-- more than 50 starvation deaths per day in the city of Lubumbashi; more than 10% of the children in Zaire's capital city, Kinshasa, are starving. There is work to be done in the name of Jesus.

An empty tomb, chiseled out of rock, was to become the scene of our greatest hope. Our Resurrected Savior calls all of us to serve Him. What higher privilege, what greater joy could there be?

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

The Most Frequently Asked Question.

While speaking in our supporting churches, we discovered that one question was asked more frequently than all others.

"How do Kimberly and Luke feel about going back?"

We are very fortunate our children are happy about returning to Africa. While our children adjusted very well to life in the USA, they have lived

most of their life in Africa.

Because our last departure from Zaire was in the middle of a civil disturbance, it is only natural to wonder if the children are scared to go back. Apparently our experience in Luena was more traumatic for the adults than the kids. The children's Grandma Wertz was out for a visit and spent the 5 hours on the floor playing with them and keeping them occupied. Thank God for Grandmothers. Although there was the noise of gunshots all

around us, our children did not see dead bodies and did not see the destruction of our home and projects. They were not highly traumatized. They understand that we are not able to return to Luena at this time and that they will be living in a new town and a new house. Like all kids making a move, they wonder about making new friends, what the new house will be like (do we each get our own bedroom?), and if the people speak "our" language. H
