Claudia Mugged At Victoria Falls

It had been nineteen years since our last visit to Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe.

Kimberly and Luke had never seen the Falls. The beauty and power is as awesome today as when David Livingstone first saw them in 1841.

At the same time our hearts were heavy remembering a young medical student, John Morris.

Nearly 10 years ago John came to visit us in Zaire and then traveled on to see the Falls. Somehow, he fell into the Falls and lost his life. His body was recovered days later and only after the wrong body had been shipped to his parents in the USA.

Tossing a flower into the Falls, we said a prayer of thankfulness for his memory and life.

While standing at the great bronze statute of David Livingstone overlooking the Falls, the kids wanted me to go to another observation point with them.

Claudia remained behind at the statute. A man with a knife came up to her and demanded our handbag containing money, credit cards, passport, and driver's licenses.

Claudia refused and when he

threatened her again with the knife she screamed. He threw her to the ground and grabbed the handbag and ran. Two men gave chase and eventually the criminal swam out to an island in the river above the Falls.

The police came with a canoe and a dog and apprehended him.

Our handbag was lost in the river. Claudia had minor cuts & scraps but thankfully she was not seriously injured.

I am amazed at how swift justice is in Zimbabwe. The next day Claudia and I testified at his trial in court. \mathcal{H}



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

A. Luke's Answer:

Yes and No. I've lived in Africa most of my life and feel very at home here. My relatives, however, are in the States. It is always great to go to the family Christmas party, have a traditional talent show, and the white elephant exchange. I wouldn't say that I feel "homesick", since Africa is home, but I do miss my relatives in the States.
