Those following our missionary work for twenty five years know that we do not make many financial appeals. I feel that we should trust God for our needs and live within our income. However, sometimes it is important to inform our supporters as to the needs of the ministry.

We have seen God's blessing and the continued growth and success of *Joy in the Harvest*. Financially we have been operating in the "lean" mode for sometime and need to increase our operating income by about 15% (\$36,000.) over the next year.

God has been faithful in finance and in every other way. Our churches and supporters have stood shoulder to shoulder with us in this work. I believe it is right to inform you of this need rather than curtail the work. Our current projects and evangelistic efforts are bearing spiritual fruit. Exciting opportunities await our response. 

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DOING GOD'S WORK IN AFRICA

Anatomy of a Mission Trip

Every mission trip is unique. Here is a brief schedule for the Illinois team's activities.

Day 1. Arrival, customs, guesthouse, Dar city tour, dinner.

Day 2. Flight to Kigoma, airport welcome, church welcome, guesthouse, dinner & sleep.

Day 3. Orientation. Tour: JOY's work sites and facilities, Livingstone Memorial, Baptist Hospital, Bible College. Rest.

Day 4. Begin work projects: Ladies' Sewing Class, cataloging library books, guesthouse construction projects, organizing used clothing, video production. Evening: Missionary Bible study (guest to speak.) Day 5. Work projects. Missionary Ladies' Bible study (guests to speak).

Day 6. Distribution of children's fishing kits with Swahili Gospel tracts. Ladies' Sewing Class.

Day 7. Shopping at the market. Work projects. Assist poor people. Ladies' Sewing Class.

Day 8. Trip to Refugee Camp for Sunday service. (Guests to speak)

Day 9. Continue work projects. Ladies Sewing Class. *Jesus Movie* evangelism after dark.

Day 10. Four hour boat trip and five hours of hiking to see wild chimpanzees in Jane Goodall's *Gombe Stream National Park*.

Day 11. Assemble distribution packs for Destitutes. Visit Destitute Camp. Ladies' Sewing Class. Evening: Missionary Bible Study (guest to speak).

Day 12. Work Projects. Photographic trip. Missionary Ladies' Bible Study. Boat trip.

Day 13. Work Projects. Assist poor people. Swimming. Dinner at Hotel.

Day 14. Arial tour of Kigoma area. Depart for Dar es Salaam.

Day 15. Mikumi Game Park.

Day 16. Return to Capital. Shopping for sovereigns.

Day 17. Depart for USA.
