Dear Friends,

After Jimmy Carter announced cancer had spread to his brain, an Internet site posted "the legacy of Jimmy Carter in 14 photos". Sometimes it is the big events of our lives that define us. But I realize it is also threads running through one's life that are important. Claudia pointed out that radio has been one of those threads for me. Another is the importance of Christian missions.

I received my first amateur radio license when I was fourteen. My best friend and his father, Mike and Harold Elliott, got me hooked. When I got my novice class license. I knocked out all the TVs in town.

All through my teenage years, my father helped me put radio antennas on the top of our house, usually in the dead of winter with snow and ice everywhere. From my bedroom, using Morse code, I could communicate with other radio operators all over the USA. When I got my general class license I began using a microphone. It was then I started speaking with overseas missionaries.

I remember helping the widows of young American missionary men who had been killed attempting to reach the Acua Indians for Christ. Some wives remained in Ecuador trying to reach that tribe with the Gospel. And they succeeded! When their children were in college in the United States, I connected the telephone to my radio and they could speak with their kids from the South American jungle. In those pre-internet days, it was the only way they could speak to each other.

At Trinity College, my friends and I started an amateur radio station. Up went another tower. Our purpose was to communicate with missionaries. When I became a missionary in Zaire (now D. R. Congo), another tower went up, this time over our simple African house. Some feared I would be suspected of being CIA. But my radio skills, learned as a teenager, were needed by the African church.

Twenty-five years ago in Tanzania, another tower went up when I received my Tanzania Amateur Radio License. Today, *Radio JOY's* two broadcast towers and antennas are sending an FM signal so everyone in this area of Africa can hear about Jesus. God continues using those two threads. Pray the result will bring big spiritual events for many Africans!

The inspectors were delayed 5 weeks. But when they came on August 18, it didn't take them long to complete their inspection of the radio station, do the necessary paperwork, and test the quality of our signal. Within two hours we had approval to begin our two month, on-the-air test period.

I had loaded a ten day long play

list into the broadcast computer. The first thing that was broadcast was the *Hallelujah Chorus* from Handel's *Messiah*. And we were on the air!

For the first two month test period we will be playing only music. We are rotating Christian and secular music every hour.

Not only is *Radio JOY* the only local radio station, it is the most powerful radio station in western Tanzania. Our power amplifier sounds like a jet engine when it starts up. First reports are coming in that our signal is loud and clear over a wide area.

A lifelong dream has come true for me. We are in need of your prayers as we go forward. \mathcal{H}


